Lord Howe Island Myrtle Rust Response Hygiene Guidelines

Basic hygiene measures

LOW RISK: For visitors or residents not involved in the myrtle rust response or living on sites with known infections.

Recommended hygiene protocol for personnel, clothing, footwear, tools and equipment.

- 1. Check personnel, clothing, footwear, backpacks and equipment for soil, plant material/propagules and other debris.
- 2. Remove all soil, plant material and other debris using a hard brush and (if required) clean water. If dirty, wash hands with soap and water.
- 3. If entering the Permanent Park Preserve use boot scrub bays on entry.
- 4. If you have recently visited the east coast of Australia or are in an area known to have myrtle rust, use the provided 70% ethanol spray bottles to sanitise any items that have not been recently laundered (e.g., bags, hats, walking boots, camera bags, walking poles etc.).

Enhanced hygiene measures

MEDIUM RISK: For visitors or residents living in or visiting a known infected site **but not** involved in the myrtle rust response.

Recommended hygiene protocol for personnel and clothing.

- 1. Avoid walking in the vicinity of infected plants or driving and parking vehicles near the infected plant.
- 2. Avoid hanging clothes near an infected plant or leaving tools and equipment where spores may settle on them.
- 3. Wash down any vehicles that may have been parked near the infected plant prior to the discovery of the infection with strong detergent.
- 4. Regularly launder clothes to remove any spores that may be on them and sanitise with 70% ethanol any items that have not been laundered (e.g., bags, hats, walking boots, camera bags, walking poles etc.).

Strict hygiene measures

HIGH RISK: For LHI Board staff, volunteers or contractors working on the myrtle rust response.

Recommended hygiene protocol for personnel, clothing, footwear, tools and equipment.

- 1. Establish a set hygiene point at the edge of the property or at a suitable location away from the infection point.
- 2. On entering the site leave any unnecessary items at the hygiene point. Do not take bags or equipment in if not needed.
- 3. Put on coveralls and change footwear at the hygiene point, clean all tools with 70%ethanol and then enter the site to undertake any work that is required.
- 4. When leaving the site:
 - a. Remove coveralls by rolling them down from the top so that the external surfaces are rolled and contained inside the suit.
 - b. After removing the coveralls sanitise any tools or equipment with 70% ethanol. Either spray liberally or dip in a bucket with 70% ethanol solution.
 - c. Bag any used coveralls, sanitise, and dispose of in the garbage.
 - d. Change back into clean footwear and spray used footwear with 70% ethanol liberally before placing them in a plastic bag for transportation
 - e. Finally, spray hands with 70% ethanol before leaving the site.
- 5. Clean any vehicle/plant and equipment surfaces that may have come into contact with infected material. Use strong detergent to wash external surfaces and spray internal surfaces with 70% ethanol.
